



Thomas can see today because of your generosity He once was blind, but now he **sews!**

When you've been a tailor your whole adult life, you appreciate the value of good eyesight. How else can you follow a pattern, thread a needle or stitch a straight seam?

But what if that good eyesight failed you?

That's what happened to a tailor named Thomas, who lives in Kapsumai village in Kenya. Thomas is married and has nine children. He's proud of his successful tailoring business, which enabled him to educate all his kids.

However, one day he noticed the vision in his left eye seemed blurry. "At first, I could no longer thread the eye of a needle. I needed to ask other people to help me. But then I'd end up sewing completely off the mark!"

A year later, the vision in his right eye also failed. His business deteriorated and finally closed. Within two years, Thomas was totally blind. He went from being the breadwinner of his family to a dependent,

unable to even walk around on his own. His wife and children needed to help him with everything.

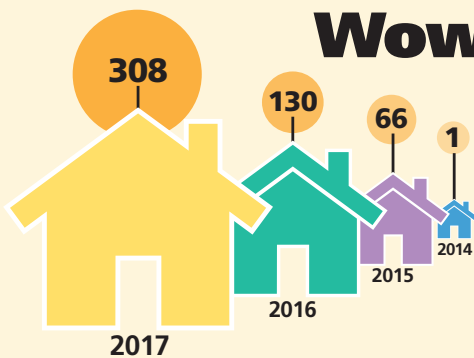
One day, when his wife was outside working on their small farm, Thomas badly injured both his legs as he fell. He was forced to stay inside to nurse his wounds, and he worried himself sick, but there was little he could do.

"My future seemed full of darkness and suffering," he told our staff. "I felt useless."

Family members encouraged Thomas to try traditional medicine, but it didn't help. Others told him to bear it, as blindness was an inevitable consequence of aging.

And then – HOPE! Thomas heard about an Operation Eyesight-supported eye unit at the nearby town of Iten. His son took him there, and he underwent cataract surgery on both eyes. His operations were successful; and today, Thomas can see – and sew – again!

"My family and I are extremely happy! Now I can thread a needle's eye just like before, and I've gone back to my tailoring business. My customers are coming back and life has become sweet again," he told us. He added with a smile, "To the people in Canada, you made my future bright. I was hopeless, but now I'm a man full of hope. Thank you!"



Our goal: 500 villages declared avoidable-blindness free!

Wow! Milestones, thanks to your support!

In Spring *SightLines*, we mentioned that we've declared 200 Indian villages free of avoidable blindness. We're excited to say that we've added another 108 villages now, bringing the total so far to 308 – all because of donors like you! When we declare a village avoidable-blindness free, it means that anyone in the village who was suffering from unnecessary blindness, or was at risk of going blind due to preventable causes, has been treated. **Isn't it exciting to know that you've been a big part of that?**

Also, thanks to your support, we've reached a landmark 100 vision centres established in India. Because of donors like you, we've accomplished this in only three short years, and 95 percent of the vision centres are now fully self-supporting. **We couldn't have achieved these milestones without you – thank you!**

Seeing really is believing in Zambia

In May 2016, we started a new eye health program in the shanty towns of Bauleni, Chawama and Mandevu, just outside Zambia's capital city, Lusaka. People in these shanty towns are extremely poor, and they know little about eye health. There are few eye care services available in the towns, so we stepped in to help change all that!

Thanks to support from Standard Chartered Bank's Seeing is Believing program, we launched our **Hospital-Based Community Eye Health Program** in Zambia as a

collaboration with our partner University Teaching Hospital, the Zambian Ministry of Health and community leaders.

Together, we've helped ensure that primary eye care is integrated with existing primary health care in the target area. To achieve this, we've renovated the existing eye clinics, purchased modern eye care equipment, and trained three ophthalmic personnel employed by the Ministry of Health. We've also trained 32 community health workers to conduct door-to-door surveys to identify those with eye health problems.

Wonderful news: as of this writing, we've screened 54,000 people and performed 53 cataract surgeries and eight other minor surgeries. **Thanks to our partners and generous donors like you, we're helping make quality eye care in each community a reality!**

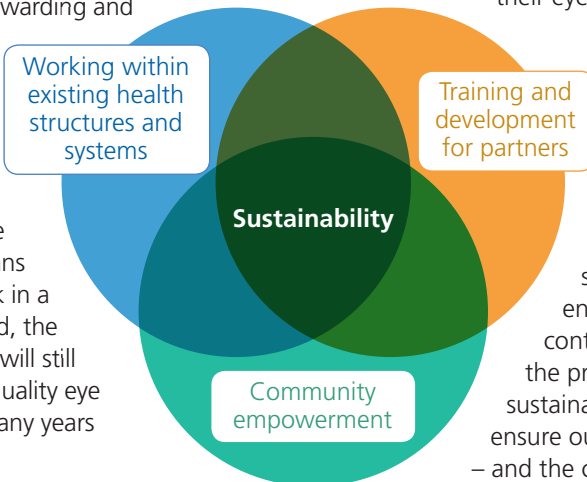

A young mom sees a brighter future because of you!

Bimala, a young mother from Nepal, had been experiencing gradual vision loss for nearly 10 years. "At first, I felt like a cloud in my eyes was gradually covering my vision," she explains. "And it was growing darker every day."

Sadly, Bimala suffered in silence for many years. Her family is very poor and they're struggling to make ends meet. She didn't want to worry them further, and she knew they couldn't afford eye care services.

Soon, even the smallest daily activities became extremely difficult. Bimala worried that she would go completely blind and would no longer be able to care for her 18-month-old daughter.

Her fears grew stronger until, one day, a community health worker from our partner Nepal Eye Hospital knocked on

her door. It proved to be one of the best days of Bimala's life! She was diagnosed with bilateral cataract and referred to the hospital for treatment.

She received cataract surgeries on both eyes – all at no cost to her or her family. Today, she can see clearly again!

Bimala says she was overjoyed at how easy it was to look after her child and her family after her surgery. She's now a proud ambassador for Nepal Eye Hospital, encouraging people to get regular eye check-ups and treatment when necessary.

And she's incredibly thankful for Operation Eyesight's wonderful donors – like you! – who helped restore her sight and her young family's future!

National blindness study supports Ghana's government plan for eye care needs

As you know, avoidable blindness remains a major health issue in developing countries, despite progress made in the last few decades in combatting blindness and visual impairment, particularly from infectious diseases.

Though visual impairment is a serious condition, few developing countries have country-specific estimates of how many of their people are affected. National blindness and low vision surveys are very expensive and time-consuming to conduct, which probably explains why they are rare, especially in African countries.

Now, Ghana has its own national study, thanks to the efforts of Dr. Boateng Wiafe, who is both our Director of

Quality and Advocacy and a renowned ophthalmologist. Dr. Bo was the principal investigator on the 2015 study, which was released recently by the Ghanaian government. Some of the findings:

- Cataract is responsible for more than half (55 percent) of the cases of blindness in Ghana. The backlog of cataract cases is estimated to be 100,000 people.
- Glaucoma was found to be the second major cause, accounting for over 19 percent of blindness in Ghana. This means almost one out of every five blind people in Ghana is blind from this disease. This high rate is particularly concerning for the health care system, as glaucoma is not curable and resulting vision loss is irreversible.
- A large proportion of cases of low vision (89 percent) and blindness (74 percent) are due to avoidable causes.
- Females have a higher risk of blindness (55 percent) than their male counterparts.
- Rural residents have a greater risk of blindness due to lack of health care facilities and information about eye care.
- Ninety-five percent of Ghanaians who have refractive errors and need to use eyeglasses do not have them.

Thanks to Dr. Bo and his team of investigators, we now have a clearer picture of the work needed in Ghana. Along with expert partners like Operation Eyesight, the government is now studying ways to make quality eye care accessible and affordable to all, no matter where they live.

And having the study completed is good news – because now there's hope! With your support, we can help many of these children, women and men see again. We know that with loyal friends like you at our side, we'll be able to restore sight and prevent blindness for many!

Glaucoma: a concern for us all!

Ghana isn't the only country concerned about glaucoma – it's the second most common cause of vision loss among Canadian seniors! Glaucoma doesn't have visible symptoms, so many people don't know they have it until they've lost some of their eyesight.

We all know how important vision is, so see your eye doctor regularly and protect your precious sight!
