Then Stenwell's vision started to blur. At first, he figured it was a symptom of his age, but his vision continued to deteriorate. He realized something was wrong, but his family couldn't afford to seek treatment. Without options, he feared his blindness was a divine punishment.

Aly never met Operation Eyesight founder Art Jenkyns, but they have much in common. Like Art, Aly believes that family shapes your life. Married to Farah for 25 years, his son Zaman is 21 and daughter Ayesha is 18.

"Family represents all the critical parts of meaningful life. They love you without conditions, build you up and keep you afloat," Aly says.

"Those you work with are also family. They help you to practice courage, loyalty and trust.

"Finally, family includes those you serve. They need you to be your best. And that's where you've been prepared to meet challenges. It's here that gratitude, humility and reverence live. Family is everything."

Aly's family fled Uganda in 1972, leaving everything, when Idi Amin vowed to kill any South Asians who didn't leave. "We abandoned all our possessions... even baby pictures!" remembers Aly. They found a new home in Canada, for which he's eternally grateful.

Growing up in Edmonton, Aly and his brother were raised by his blind grandmother. "I often wonder how her life – and ours – would have been if her condition had been discovered earlier."

Aly recently visited Kenya, India and Nepal and talked to people whose lives have been transformed through the gift of sight. "The feeling of pride in our work, and seeing the difference we're making, was incredible," he says.

"Thank you for being part of the Operation Eyesight family," Aly says. "Together we can eliminate avoidable blindness!"

Three generations of support

Operation Eyesight has become tradition for the Hatfield family.

Sylvia Hatfield and her husband, Reverend Donald, first heard about Operation Eyesight from Donald's mother, Mabel. "Mabel heard Art Jenkyns (founder of Operation Eyesight) speak just as he was getting started," says Sylvia. "She told us she was supporting Art's work to bring sight to the poor in India. We thought it was a fantastic idea."

Don convinced the Canadian Forces Protestant Chapels to support what was then "Art Jenkyns' little charity." Sylvia told everyone in her Sunday School classes about Operation Eyesight.

"We love that Operation Eyesight is Canadian," Sylvia says. "We truly believe in the cause. Giving someone back their sight may seem like such a small thing at first, but it's far-reaching. Being able to see again not only helps the individual and their family, but the entire community."

Sylvia's daughter Sara has been a donor for 30 years. Her passion for the charity grew "through osmosis." Her first cataract surgery was at age 39. "If I'd been born in another country, I could very well be blind right now," Sara says. She enjoys following in her grandmother's footsteps and is happy we work sustainably, helping people to help themselves.
